Rosenwald Schools Project of Caswell County

Caswell History Speaks created a Podcast in 2023 that captures the beginnings of a one room school and ends with a celebration of accomplishments have not been told before in a historical perspective of how African American children of Caswell County were educated and who attended the Rosenwald Schools. The Rosenwald Schools in Caswell County Beulah. Blackwell. were: Dotmond. Milton, New Ephesus, and Yanceyville. By listening to the storytellers recalled experiences, the listeners will gain a vivid idea of how black youth were educated in the segregated south during the 1940's through 1960's. These African American storytellers share their stories of the one room schoolhouses, its student's commitment to move forward in spite of segregation, and the celebration of the triumph over that system. The Podcast, (Episodes 1-4), consists of current and former Caswell residents who will also talk about how the foundations of religion played a part in the African American educational experience in Caswell County as well. We cannot let our history die. Let's continue to tell our stories for documentation.



On Oct 8, 1915, the Warren Grove School, North Carolina's first Rosenwald School, was completed. During the 1914-1915 academic year, NC received funding for its first Rosenwald schools, although the Rosenwald Fund's School Building Program did not begin until the nonprofit was incorporated in 1917. Using Tuskegee's architectural plans for school houses as a model, the Warren Grove School in Chowan County, a twoteacher floorplan, was built for a total cost of \$1,622. The black community had contributed \$486, the white community and the school system furnished \$836, and Julius Rosenwald himself had contributed \$300, the maximum amount initially allocated for any schoolhouse. Maud Gatewood Special Exhibit Blowing Rock, NC - June 2024 Blowing Rock, NC (April 8, 2024)—The Blowing Rock Art & History Museum (BRAHM) is announcing an upcoming exhibition, "The Hard Edge & The Soft Line: A Retrospective of Maud Gatewood." The exhibition will be on view in the Fort, Atwell, and Rankin East Galleries of the Museum from June 28, 2024, through January 5, 2025.

Maud Gatewood (1934–2004) remains a central figure in the art history of North Carolina and America. A painter of exacting technique with a keen eye for composition and cultural commentary, her pictures captured the Carolinas—and the world beyond—across much of the 20th century.

A native of Yanceyville in Caswell County, NC, Gatewood's paintings reveal rural landscapes and people in the midst of transformation while cleverly framing the experience of modern life with acerbic wit and a wealth of empathy. Read more by clicking *here*.



More on Julius Rosenwald




Julius Rosenwald, American businessman & philanthropist. Best known as part-owner and leader of Sears, Roebuck and Company, and for establishing the Rosenwald Fund. After moderate success in the clothing business in *New York City* (1879–85) and *Chicago* (1885–95), Rosenwald bought a one-fourth interest in *Sears, Roebuck and Company*, which became the world's largest mail-order house and chain of retail stores. In 1910 he succeeded *Richard Warren Sears* as president, and in 1925 he was named chairman of the Sears board of directors. Rosenwald and A.H. Loeb, treasurer of the company, established

an *exemplary* savings and profit-sharing program for employees. Under Rosenwald's leadership, Sears began to manufacture its own merchandise

and instituted the policy of guaranteeing full refunds to dissatisfied customers.

Inspired by *Booker T. Washington* in the early 1900s, he was concerned with the welfare of Black Americans. In 1917 he established the Julius Rosenwald Fund (to be expended within 25 years after his death and liquidated in 1948), the chief purpose of which was the improvement of education for *African American* students. Augmented by local taxes and private gifts and working in partnership with Washington, the fund paid for the construction of roughly 5,000 schools—later *dubbed Rosenwald schools*—in 15 southern states. The fund also gave fellowship grants to Black artists and writers, including *Marian Anderson, Maya Angelou, W.E.B. Du Bois, Aaron Douglas, Katherine Dunham, Langston Hughes*, and *Augusta Savage*. Congratulations to Anthony Hearn!!! What a voice!!



Congratulations Angela and the people of Milton for this wonderful example of sharing history in a way all can positively relate!


