Yanceyville 9-11 Memorial Dedication Monday, September 11, 2023

It was an emotional day for many on Monday, September 11, as the Town of Yanceyville held a dedication service for the 9-11 Memorial. The monument features a portion of a steel girder from Tower Two of the World Trade Center. American Legion Post 89 and VFW Post 7316 presented the colors and Mrs. Naomi Totten sang the National Anthem. Following the ceremony the town provided refreshments hosted at the Richmond-Miles Museum.

Although no one from Caswell County was in the towers that day, we did lose a soldier fighting the War on Terror. Sgt. Colby L. Richmond was Killed in Action during Operation Enduring Freedom on 8/25/2011 in Helmand, Afghanistan. He was a paratrooper in XVIII Sustainment Brigade out of Fort Bragg.





History of Pumpkin Pie Spice...

Every fall, grocery stores line their shelves with pumpkin spice-flavored products that range from traditional pumpkin pies to the more questionable pumpkin spice candy corn. The flavor is a mixture of nutmeg, cinnamon, ginger and cloves—all spices that humans have enjoyed in their food for a long time.

In fact, researchers have discovered that humans have been using nutmeg as food for 2,000 years longer than previously thought. On Pulau Ay, one of the Banda Islands in Indonesia, archaeologists found ancient nutmeg residue on ceramic pottery shards that they estimate to be 3,500 years old.

The wild turkey population in the state was nearly extinct when Milton resident, R. Wayne Bailey become involved.

Bailey's 10-year study on the population dynamics of wild turkeys is the landmark science of that sector. In all, he wrote more than 100 papers and self-published two books advancing the profession of wildlife management, wildlife conservation and turkey hunting.

Baily's work helped to retore the population of these birds across the state. Turkeys from Caswell County were used to help repopulate the almost extinct species.

CENTURY FARM ORCHARD

A Caswell County farm that is key to saving many southern heirloom apple varities right here in the county, is highlighted in **OUR STATE** magazine this month.

The Century Farm website says: We are helping to preserve apples that were once widely grown in the southern United States from the 1600's to the early 1900's. Southern farm families grew apples that displayed distinctive qualities. Some were good for eating fresh from the tree, some for cooking, some for drying, some for cider, and others were unique for their ripening period or keeping ability.

These apples were important because they were good producers in the warm, humid climate of the South. It is unfortunate that many old southern apples are now extinct, disappearing with family farms that once dotted the landscape. It is the intention of Century Farm Orchards to cultivate old southern apples that are still available today and provide
