The annual Veterans Day 2024 event will be held in Yanceyville at the Town Pavilion on Monday, November 11 11:00 a.m


This is an outdoor event so bring your chairs.

Spotlight on Caswell County WWII Veteran William Vernon Briggs

William Vernon Briggs was born in Caswell County on September 29, 1925. He was the third of seven sons of Lemuel Hassel Briggs and Nannie Kimbro Briggs of the Leasburg Community. In addition to William Vernon, Mr. and Mrs. Briggs would have two other sons who served in the US Military. The oldest brother, Alvis Briggs, served in the US Navy from 1942-1946, and Hassell Briggs, served in the US Army from 1946-1947.

Vernon Briggs, as he was known as, entered the US Navy on October 12, 1944. His draft card describes him as being 5'8' blonde hair and blue eyes and weighing 150 pounds. He received training at the United States Naval Training Center Bainbridge (USNTC Bainbridge) at Port Deposit, Maryland under the Commander of the Fifth Naval District, based in Norfolk, Virginia. the training center sat between various important naval centers of World War II: about 35 miles northeast of Baltimore, Maryland, and 75 miles from Washington, D.C., and Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. By the end of World War II, the center had trained 244,277 recruits who transferred to various ships and stations throughout the world.

After additional training at the USNTC in Miami he was sent to Houston, Texas and he boarded the USS Pembina (AKA200) on May 22, 1945, and the ship was commissioned on May 25th. The ship was named for Pembina County, North Dakota and was a cargo ship that was constructed for the U.S. Navy during the closing period of World War II.

From there he sailed to Panama and crossed the International Date Line on July 24, 1945. He sailed to the Marshall Islands, Philippines, Manila, Okinawa, and arrived In Japan Yokosuka on January 2, 1946. He was assigned to the ship until January 22, 1946, when it was decommissioned. Briggs achieved the rank of a Sc2(Seaman Second Class) and was discharged from service on July 3, 1946.

After returning home he married Mary Frances Hamlett of Roxboro, with whom he had corresponded during the war. They were married on February 14, 1948. According to the US Federal Census of 1950, they were living in the Longhurst Community in Person County. He was employed as a twister in a textile mill. He later became an insurance agent and was employed by American General Insurance Company until his retirement. Mr. Briggs was a member of Longhurst United Methodist Church in Roxboro and served on numerous boards and committees.

William Vernon Briggs died on June 5, 2019, and is buried in Person Memorial Cemetery. He was survived by his three children, Gregg Briggs, Jimmy Briggs, Sr., and Roddy Kimbro Briggs.

Spotlight on Caswell County WWI Veteran Walter Madden

Walter Madden was born in Caswell County on May 5, 1894, to Henry Madden and Lucy Ann Blackwell Madden. He was educated in the local school system. He registered for the draft on June 1, 1917, in Caswell County. At the time he registered for the draft he was employed by D. Fowler, JR. and Company in Haverstraw, New York, located at the widest point of the Hudson River. He was inducted into the US Army on June 18,1918.

Walter Madden was sent to Camp Taylor, Kentucky for training. Camp Taylor was named for the 12th President of the United States, Zachary Taylor. Camp Zachary Taylor was the largest of sixteen military training camps built in the United States during World War I. The camp was constructed in only 90 days employing 10,000 workers. About 150,000 soldiers trained at the camp from September 1917 to the end of the war in November 1918.



After training for 3 months, he was transferred to Camp Merritt located in Bergen County, New Jersey. Camp Merritt was named for Wesley Merritt who served in the American Indian Wars, and Spanish-American War. He also served as Superintendent of West Point. Camp Merritt was the U.S. Arm's largest staging area for soldiers bound for French and Belgian battlefields. 570,000 men passed through, staying mere days before riding trains and ferries to Hoboken, where they boarded transport ships. Captain Harry S. Truman and Sgt. Alvin York were among the soldiers that passed through the camp.

Walter Madden would serve with Co. C of the 801st Pioneer Infantry. Colonel George F. Hamilton was the commanding officer. His company of 244 men would sail from Hoboken, New Jersey, Pier 5 on September 8th at 8:30 am. aboard the USS Manchuria to France (see photo below of the Manchuria).



While in France, the 801st was assigned to the 1st U.S. Army. Pioneer Regiments were comprised of African American soldiers. They prepared trenches and battlefields for combat. After the battles they cleared the fields of carnage and ordinance, spent and unspent. During the final push in the war, The

Meuse-Argonne Offensive, some of the Pioneer Infantry units fixed roads and cut barb wire. Additionally, the preserved books from the local libraries. After the Armistice was signed on November 11, 1918, they helped repair France while they awaited their return home.

Pvt. Madden sailed from Brest, France aboard the USS Acon on May 23, 1919. He arrived at Newport News on June 5, 1919. Records were unavailable for his life after the war; however, the 1940 census lists him living with his nephew, William Henderson and wife, Annie in the Locust Hill Community in Caswell County.

On February 19, 1958, Walter Madden died at the Winslow Hospital in Danville. He was buried in the church cemetery of the Yanceyville Baptist Church (see gravestone below).

Triad Honor Flights

To transport America's Veterans to Washington, DC to visit those memorials dedicated to honor the service and sacrifices of themselves and their friends. Although Triad Honor Flight was incorporated in 2020, flights from Greensboro were held from 2009-2011. Organized by Rotary District 7690, around 1300 WWII Veterans were transported to Washington DC. We are very excited to now be including all

Veterans to include WWII, Korean War, Vietnam War and all those who served in between.
